

CLAIRE: This can't happen. This can't be happening.

MAGGIE: Relax, breathe, calm down.

CLAIRE: No, no, you don't get it.

CLAIRE: Okay, I want you to stay calm.

MAGGIE: I am calm.

CLAIRE: It's gotta be on your end.

MAGGIE: What?

CLAIRE: We're getting a spoofed signal from the Resolution. From AMI.

MAGGIE: She had a full diagnostic on Mars, after we dropped Petrov off. All systems came up green.

CLAIRE: Unless that was faked. If your computer has been compromised, then you can't trust any of these diagnostics. Any signals we're getting here would be suspect.

MAGGIE: No. No way. Only Petrov, myself, and the base technician Ellenwood had access to Ami during our layover.

CLAIRE: It wasn't Petrov, but Ellenwood... he might have ties to the separatist movement.

MAGGIE: Okay, we can't trust the diagnostics, but I can try to find out if someone altered her records. Ami, bring up your access logs from the layover at the Mars Granger base.

AMI: Accessing.

CLAIRE:                   Wouldn't they just have erased their footprint?

MAGGIE:                 Only the specifics. There'd still be evidence of missing files  
in the system checksums.

CLAIRE:                 Maggie, you only have seven minutes until you cross the red  
line.

MAGGIE:                 Yeah, so I don't have time to waste trying to fix the wrong  
problem. Ami, bring up the log of when Technician  
Ellenwood was accessing your system.

AMI:                     Insufficient data.

CLAIRE:                 What?

MAGGIE:                 It means that the records don't exist.

CLAIRE:                 That's not what she said.

MAGGIE:                 She only has a set of stock recorded phrases, but that's what  
she means when she says it.

CLAIRE:                 How can you tell?

MAGGIE:                 I spent a month in isolation with nobody else to talk to. I got

to know her extremely well.

CLAIRE: Okay, no records.

MAGGIE: Ellenwood must have erased them.

CLAIRE: It had to have been him.

MAGGIE: That doesn't make any sense, though. The records would be the first thing people checked when... when trying to piece together what went wrong.

CLAIRE: And it absolutely implicates him.

MAGGIE: If he was the saboteur there's no way he wouldn't realise how it'd look.

CLAIRE: He might have logged them under someone else's name.

MAGGIE: Ami, list the personnel who accessed your systems on Mars.

AMI: Captain Margaret Kincaid. End of File.

CLAIRE: What?

MAGGIE: Repeat that list?
